

The London Hellenic Prize

This prestigious international award was originally conceived by John A. Hadjipateras OBE, Chairman of the Greek Shipping Co-operation Committee for eighteen years, and by John D. Criticos, ship-owner, businessman and prominent member of the London Greek Community since the 1950s. Inspired by the ideals of Hellenic culture and appreciative of the best commercial and cultural traditions of British society, both men committed themselves to the promotion of Anglo-Hellenic understanding in a number of significant ways. John D. Criticos devoted himself to long-lasting works of charity in both countries and, after his death, Mrs. Elizabeth Criticos-Fotinelli continued and enhanced his charitable projects.

The Prize usually receives more than 100 submissions each year from numerous publishers and individual authors around the globe, from California to Sydney. Areas of interest are not restricted and, since its inception, the Prize has been awarded to books on archaeology, architecture, art, classics, history, literary criticism, social studies, as well as to numerous works of literature in recent years. The list of winners overleaf shows the wide range of scholarship, subject matter and original research recognised over the years by the Adjudicating Committee. This is a truly international award in scope and substance.

The Adjudicating Committee is composed of authors, artists, historians and scholars with specialist knowledge of each of the fields for which there are eligible candidates. The Committee's membership is flexible and reflects the subject matters of works submitted annually, ensuring that all candidates are afforded the best assessment possible by leading experts. The bursary of the Prize has always been £10,000.

John D. Criticos chose to entrust the administration of this Prize to the London Hellenic Society, a notable cultural society established in London in the 1960s by prominent members of the London Greek community on the foundations of the long and distinguished Hellenic presence in England since the late 18th century. London, particuarly, has always been at the centre of the thriving Hellenic diaspora. Individuals like Dimitris Vikelas, the novelist and Bloomsbury-based shipping executive who organised the First Olympic Games of 1896, and Eleftherios Venizelos and his wife Helena Schilizzi, based at Athlone House, Highgate, have created the most philhellenic spirit in England in modern times.

As the English-speaking world becomes progressively larger and more interconnected, the Prize endeavours to strengthen the understanding of our shared European heritage and the ideals of Hellenism.
