

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The London Hellenic Prize

This renowned international award was originally conceived by John A. Hadjipateras OBE, Chairman of the Greek Shipping Co-operation Committee for eighteen years, and by John D. Criticos, ship-owner, businessman and prominent member of the London Hellenic community since the 1950s. Inspired by the ideals of Hellenic culture whilst immersed in the best commercial and cultural traditions of British society, both men committed themselves to the promotion of Anglo-Hellenic understanding in a number of significant ways. John D. Criticos, specifically, devoted himself to long-lasting charitable projects in both countries, which Mrs Elizabeth Criticos-Fotinelli continued and enhanced after his death.

The Prize usually receives more than 100 submissions each year from numerous publishers and individual authors around the globe, from Los Angeles to Sydney. Areas of interest are not restricted and, since its inception, the Prize has been awarded to books on archaeology, architecture, art, classics, history, literary criticism, social studies, as well as to numerous works of fiction in recent years. The list of winners overleaf shows the wide range of scholarship and subject matter and originality recognised over the years by the Adjudicating Committee. This is a truly international award in scope and substance.

The Adjudicating Committee includes authors, artists, historians and scholars with specialist knowledge of all the fields for which there are eligible candidates. The Committee's membership is flexible and reflects the subject matter of works submitted annually, ensuring that all candidates are afforded the best assessment possible by leading experts. The bursary of the Prize is £10,000.

The Prize has always been administered by the London Hellenic Society, a notable cultural society established in London in the 1960s on the foundations of the long and distinguished Hellenic presence in England since the late eighteenth century. London, particularly, has always been a nexus of commercial, political and cultural exchange. It was the parallel and collective efforts of individuals like Bloomsbury-based shipping executive Dimitris Vikelas, Highgate-based Domini Crosfield, and Eleftherios Venizelos and his wife Helena Schilizzi which helped grow the most philhellenic spirit in England in modern times. It is this proud tradition which the London Hellenic Society strives to strengthen.
